THOUGHTS WHILE DRIVING MESSAGE FROM DOUG CARLISLE

Memories of the Chimney Rock Hill Climb

It was 1960. I had just turned 17 years old. The *Chimney Rock Hill Climb* had just turned four. It was still in it's infancy and would run for another thirty five years becoming a rite of spring for hundreds of people. It would change people's lives and introduce spectators to European automobiles. Some of those spectators would drive racing cars the rest of their lives.

This is the continuation of Doug's reflections on the events at the Chimney Rock Hill Climb.

The crowd on Turn 6 could sometimes be a little rowdy, maybe a little too festive. But it was almost like they were cheering the drivers on. The more enthusiastic the drivers came through the turns, the more the cheers came up. The hillclimb was truly a driver and spectator event. Memories of The Chimney Rock Hillclimb

But let's go back to 1960.

I was just as crazy about sports cars then as I am now. So when I learned about this thing up at Chimney Rock I had to go see what it was all about. A friend borrowed his dad's car, we pooled our change for gas money and headed out. By the time we left we had convinced a couple of others to join us. We needed their money.

We arrived a Chimney Rock only to find that there was an admission charge. Having only enough to pay for one person, we did the next best thing. We gave what money we had left to the fellow with the car, one hid in the trunk, and the other two climbed up the side of the mountain . I was one of the two who had to climb the mountain. Sometime when you are up a Chimney Rock take a look down the side . To this day I still don't know how we did it. But , when we finally came out in the parking lot we both looked like we had been stranded in the woods for about a year. We were dirty, we were scratched , and our clothes were shredded. But we were there.

The parking lot where we came out is what is referred to as "The Meadows". In those days even the spectators came in their sports cars. So the parking area was filled with **Healeys**, **Jags**, **MGs** and all kind of European machinery. We didn't think much about it then, but, today it would be a monster car show.

RESTORATION STORY -- '53 MG TD



In November 1997, a friend of mine and his wife had visited a client of his in Warsaw, NC. When they returned, she was telling me about the visit and a car that the client had. It was a 1953 *MG TD* that he had

purchased new in Panama City, Panama.

Noble Martin, the owner of this unique vehicle, was a geologist working in Panama City. While driving through the city his old Buick broke down. .He pulled to the side of the road and removed his belongings and proceeded to walk down the street. He came to a dealership and saw the 1953 **MG TD** in the show room. Mr. Martin went in and bought the car and drove it off to finish his assignment in Panama. He then drove the car back to the state of Florida where he lived. Later, he and his family relocated to Warsaw, NC.

For the next forty-four years, he drove the car daily until the summer of 1997. At that time the family realized at the age of 90 he should slow down and stop driving. They were afraid that he may have an accident or kill someone. He expressed an interest in selling the car to my friend and his wife. After she told me about all of this, I asked her husband ifhe would contact Mr Martin and ask him if I could call him concerning buying the car. He agreed. I called Mr. Martin and discussed the condition of the car and made an appointment to drive down to Warsaw to see the car. During the conversations he told me how much he wanted for the car.

I borrowed a trailer from a friend and Margaret and I drove the 4.5 hours to Warsaw on a Saturday morning. After getting there and looking at the MG TD, Mr. Martin increased his price by \$2,000. I told him I could not pay that much for the car. After having a nice discussion with him, we shook hands and departed Warsaw thinking I would probably never find another one. Margaret insisted I stop and call him and make an offer, which I did and he said he would just keep the car. We drove back to Shelby very disappointed, arriving home around midnight.

The next morning around seven AM my phone rang and a voice asked, "Are you the man that made an offer on my MG TD yesterday?" I told him I was and he said — "Well you have been the hardest SOB to find. I have called every Greene in Shelby! I have decided to accept your offer if you still want the car" I told him I would take it and would be down in a few hours to pick up the car.

Fortunately, the trailer was still hooked up to the Suburban and I picked up Margaret and off we went. When we pulled into Mr. Martin's driveway, he was on the porch with a large number of boxes of part. He had kept all of the orginal parts, generator, shocks, master cylinder, starter, etc. I paid Mr. Martin, he signed the title and we loader everything onto the trailer.



I started to walk to the MG TD to drive it onto the trailer and Mr. Martin would not let me do it. He said he would drive the car onto the trailer. We said our goodbyes and thanked him

again. As we started down the driveway, Margaret heard him say, "Bye-bye little car!"

Once in Shelby, the car started a five year total restoration under the direction of Lou May, Kent Bridges brother-in-law. He began by taking the car apart and evaluating what had to be done to restore it to its 1953 condition.

Here are a few pictures that I took to document the condition of the car. It is interesting how this car withstood daily driving for such a long time.



Part of the frame is made from wood and you can see the condition of the springs and the wheels.





Once it was apart and we had a plan on how to restore the car, it became a long and involved process. The chrome parts were sent off to California to be redone. The

wooden frame had to be rebuilt. All of the body parts had to be sandblasted, primed and then three coats of paint with dry sanding in between to get the final finish. You can see the progression of Lou's handy work in these pictures.





Lou was a perfectionist on each step of the process





The attention to detail can be seen in the number plate for the car. It looks like it came from the show room floor.



Almost five years since we started, the car began to come together. I was anxious to get to enjoy the car. Lou was interested in finishing the restoration and doing it right. You can imagine how excited I was when I would visit the shop and saw the car outside, looking ready to go again.



In 2003, Margaret and I took the restored MG TD to a Gathering MG's in Williamsburg, VA. There were two parts to the show. On Thursday night, we won the First Timer Award for Best Car. On Saturday, we won First Place in our class in a field of 22 other MG TD's. The show sponsor said that this was the first time a car won both awards. I was certainly proud of how the "little car" performed.

Well, the four of us somehow managed to rendezvous with each other and began the task of finding a good spectating place. One by one the racers zoomed up the mountain with us stopping at every corner to take in the sights and sounds of what we had only seen on television. Tires squalling, exhaust pipes belching fire, and engines screaming. We all thought we had died and gone to that great race track in the sky.

We wound up , of course, on Turn 6—along with the ten thousand that I mentioned earlier. But it was a great place to catch the action on film and since my dad was a photographer I often carried a camera .It was not like today . Today everyone has a camera in some form or another. And on this day I had my Yashica twins lens reflex and it was about to capture a photo that would make history. Not really, but, I'll tell you about it later.
