#### WAKING SLEEPING BEAUTY PART 5

I guess it is time to get serious about working on the *Mercedes* again. I have let it slide as I did some maintenance work around the house and attended to some other matters. I have however been working two evenings a week in machine shop classes at *Cleveland Community College*, fabricating parts for the AC unit. There seems to be no end to this work. As each time I get one piece fabricated or modified I find that it affects another part and I must modify or replace that piece. Thankfully this is about complete and I will be able to concentrate on the paint work.



One of the major problems with the paint on the car is the amount of paint on the car. Someone really wanted to get a slick paint job, so they evidently sprayed on multiple layers of red oxide primer and sanded it down smooth. Then they put on the topcoat. This gives a very slick paintjob – for a while. Then the paint starts to crack. As the paint is exposed to changing temperatures, the various layers of paint will expand and contract at different rates, causing the paint to crack and craze. The only real solution for this problem is to remove the damaged paint and then repaint the car. That is where I am right now.

I toyed around with several ideas for removing the paint. One way is to use a chemical paint stripper to remove the paint. The strippers work very well but have several drawbacks. Care must be used here because some of the strippers will destroy aluminum. Since the hood, doors, deck lid and the soft top storage cover are aluminum; this is not a very good option. If strippers are used, the parts must be stripped down to the bare metal. This means the removal of any and all paints, primers and plastic fillers. Strippers are very messy and hazardous to the environment and to humans and animals. Also, all, and I mean all, of the stripper must be removed from the metal and neutralized. If there are any traces of the stripper left on the surfaces or in the cracks and crevices paint will not adhere to the surface. I just don't think this is the way I want to go.

Another way is to have the car sandblasted. Sandblasting works best when the car is completely disassembled and the different pieces blasted individually. Sandblasting and bead blasting work very well on hard parts, but not as well on wide expanses of sheet metal. Sand blasting destroys aluminum. It is almost impossible to remove all the sand from all the cracks and crevices, meaning that paint will not stick to these surfaces. One of the major drawbacks for sandblasting is the fact that the sand beating on the metal generates a great deal of heat. This heat causes sheet metal to warp thereby generating a lot of unnecessary bodywork. Lastly, sandblasting is very hazardous to humans. Again, I decided this is not the way to go.

Several other types of blasting media (walnut shells, aluminum oxide, plastic shot and I do not know what all) are available. Each method of stripping has a purpose and works well for a particular situation. The key is to use the method that fits your situation. For instance, still another way to remove paint is to soda blast the car. I have never used this method, but I am told they use bicarbonate of soda to blast away the paint. It removes paint but does not remove rust. Supposedly, the soda does not harm glass or rubber. I am not convinced. The soda is a one time use material and is just dissipated into the environment with no apparent harm. What is left on the car can be washed off with water. I suspect a lot of the soda ends up in places it is not wanted and is hard to remove. I decided not to use this method either.

Neither of these paint removal methods is an ideal solution. There is still a lot of prep work to be done after the blasting, but before the car can be painted. With any of the above stripping methods, the metal must be protected immediately to keep it from rusting. Just letting the metal sit over night or touching it with bare hands can cause the metal to start rusting.

That leaves the more labor intensive method of removing the paint with sandpaper and elbow grease. In 1967 when my car was built, **Mercedes** was doing a good job with undercoats and with paints. They also did a good job with sealing the cracks and crevices. I don't think I can get a better seal than *Mercedes* did. My plan is to remove the outer layer(s) with an aggressive cut sandpaper. When I get to the red oxide primer, I will switch to a finer grit paper like 320 or 360. Since the red oxide primer sands very easy, I can use the finer grit paper and water sand down to the original paint. This should give an excellent surface to build on. If I find that the sub-straits are not good, I will do whatever I need to do to build a good foundation. This could include, but not be limited to, sanding to bare metal, cleaning of all foreign matter, acid etching with a phosphoric acid based solution, neutralizing and painting with a good epoxy primer.

Many people do not like to water sand. They think that if the sanding process doesn't use electricity, make a lot of noise and create a lot of dust, it is not doing anything. I find that water sanding gives me the best surface to paint on and eliminates the dusts created by other sanding techniques,

I would not recommend hand sanding for paint removal in every situation. For instance, I have an old *Ford* that has been completely disassembled. In this case, I think dipping in a chemical vat is the preferred solution, along with bead blasting of some of the smaller parts. Ideally, I would like to dip the body to strip it, dip it again to neutralize the stripping chemicals, phosphate it and then prime it, but I do not know anyone who can do all this so I will probably have it dipped and then do all the prep work myself. But that is another story. The *Mercedes* comes first for now.
