MAKING YOUR CAR MORE DEPENDABLE

I am going to change gears and write about something other than a *Mercedes* this time around.

I am sure that at least some of you have gone out to whatever special interest car you have and discovered that the battery is dead, especially after letting it sit for an extended period of time. If yours is a traditional lead acid battery, the battery is probably past saving and is good only for use as a core to trade in on a new battery. The battery usually has a white powder surrounding the battery posts and sometimes the powder has spilled down onto the battery box and other parts of the engine compartment. As you probably know, this white stuff is corrosive to paint, metal and especially cotton clothing. Repairs to battery boxes and other metal parts destroyed by leaking battery acid have always been just an accepted fact of working on an old car.

Fortunately there are batteries on the market that minimize the corrosive characteristics of the traditional lead acid batteries. One of these is the *Absorbed Gas Mat* (*AGM*) battery manufactured by *Optima*. There are others but this is the one I am most familiar with. A disclaimer—I do not have any connection with *Optima*, and do not stand to profit from the sale of any *Optima* batteries. I just know that they work. I have one in each of my vehicles.

Some of the reasons I like *Optima* batteries is they can be mounted in almost any position, even upside down and will not spill. They are maintenance free, much more vibration resistant than normal lead acid batteries and offer a stronger initial starting burst and have a longer lifespan. They are offered in a variety of side post and top post configurations. I find that these batteries do not bleed down as fast as some other batteries, and under the right circumstances can be brought back from discharge situations that would kill other batteries. I have one battery that has been killed twice, once for two weeks. I was prepared to buy another battery but decided to just try to charge the old one, not really expecting to succeed. I charged it using the technique described below and it will still start my truck.

Charging a depleted AGM battery can be somewhat tricky. A regular off the shelf charger just will not work. The best way is to use a charger especially designed for this type battery. *Optima* offers one for about \$100.00 and another for about \$200.00. Other manufacturers have comparable chargers and maintainers. I think either one would work for most of us. They will also charge conventional batteries. An alternative way to charge an *AGM* battery is to charge a regular lead acid battery to full charge. Then hook up the regular battery and the *AGM* battery is parallel. Next attach the battery charger (again in parallel with the two batteries) and charge the two batteries, on low, for about an hour, or until the *AGM* battery has at least 10

volts. Disconnect the regular battery and continue to charge the *AGM* battery until it is fully charged.

As with anything there is a price to pay for all this goodness in *AGM* batteries. A normal *Optima* starting battery will cost in the neighborhood of \$200.00. A deep cycle battery will run a bit more. I think they are worth the money.

A good way to purchase an *Optima* battery is to order the battery and a charger directly from *Optima*. If I read their website right, they will pay the freight and you do not have to pay any sales tax on the purchase. Of course, that means you would not be supporting your local merchants or your state. But on the other hand, the merchant my not be local. They just have a physical presence here to siphon off money to another location.

Of course an *AGM* battery is probably not correct for most of our cars and would loose points is a judged event. If however you want to make your weekend cruiser more reliable, an *AGM* battery may be the way to go.
